Don't Miss the Centennial Celebration!!!

Here is an event Scouts and Scouters of all ages will not want to miss! On April 24 and 25 the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting will celebrate the 100th anniversary of Boy Scouting in style. Come experience our spectacular, fun event, including the opening of a new exhibit on the history of Scouting, a puppet parade with a Cub Scout band, a visit from Lord Baden-Powell, demonstrations, creation of a time capsule, and FOOD. The celebration runs from 10-5 on Saturday and 12-5 on Sunday.

Our new exhibit, A Century of Scouting, tells the national and regional story of the BSA. Discover the vital role our region has played in the development of Scouting and learn the stories of the people who made Scouting go. Pictures, documents, and artifacts help tell the stories of Scouts, jamborees, leaders, and programs. Hey, who really invented the Pinewood Derby and when? What you see at the Museum on April 24-25 will be the core of a traveling exhibit that will be available to county history museums throughout the region later this year.

Whether you visit the Museum on April 24-25 alone or with your Scouting unit, there will be a number of ways to participate in the celebration. Your unit can attend the event and take part in the fun as a group or as individuals and families. Participate in the Saturday afternoon parade and contribute to the time capsule. Either way, you and your unit can be part of history.

On each day of the event, we will have a special guest. On Saturday afternoon, our special guest will be Dave Kenney, author of *Honor Bright: A Century of Scouting in Northern Star Council*. Nominated for a Minnesota Book Award, you

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He also received the Order of the Arrow Distinguished Service Award. Most notably, Dr. Yocum was recognized with the BSA Heroism award. Today, Dr. Yocum is both on the board of his local Last Frontier Council and is a representative to the national BSA Council.

In his "spare time", Dr. Yocum has spent the last 30 years travelling the country portraying the founder of Scouting, Lord Baden-Powell. He says he grew into the Baden-Powell role as he got older and began looking more and more like the founder of Scouting. A serious collector, Dr. Yocum has studied what Baden-Powell wore at his public appearances and he has assembled uniforms to match. Thus, depending on the event and the weather, Dr. Yocum will wear what BP would have worn to the occasion. You will not want to miss seeing BP at the Museum's BSA Centennial celebration!

FROM THE DIRECTOR

February, the official Boy Scout Centennial month, was extremely busy, but very gratifying. We had a presence at eleven Blue and Gold or Troop/District Centennial events and hosted two big events ourselves: our first-ever Blue and Gold Dinner and a Boy Scout Centennial birthday party on February 7. During that time, more than 1800 people got to experience a little bit of Boy Scout history first hand. Our "Museum without Walls" program lived up to its name as we displayed in places as diverse as Hopkins, Mahtomedi, Farmington, and Northfield, with a lot of other places in between.

This first-hand opportunity to see some of Scouting's past was a new experience for many people who came out to these events. Generally, Boy Scouting (and Girl Scouting) are not backward-looking organizations—their concern is with the kids in front of them, and their futures. But it doesn't hurt, occasionally, to look behind you and assess where you have been. History informs our present by showing us how we have arrived at the point we are at. That path, through thickets of almost infinite choice, roadblocks, and great opportunity, helps us figure out how to move forward—what worked in the past, what did not work, and the power of many dedicated individuals, all pursuing the same end.

The North Star Museum holds the secrets and successes of the past, and we try to reveal them to you every time you visit. In the future, I hope to be able to report more frequently through our website on some of the discoveries that we are making.
