Our 10th Founders Hall event is a "must see" occasion. This year's honorees are 56-year Girl Scout volunteer, leader, and song aficionado, Sharon Reece, and long-time Northern Star Council volunteer and former North Star Museum Board member, Hugh Gwin.

In addition to honoring

two new inductees to the Founders Hall, we will have a special keynote speaker at this year's event. The Museum welcomes Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Commissioner Sarah Strommen. The Museum is excited to announce that our keynote address at the 2022 Founders Hall Recognition and Celebration is Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Commissioner Sarah Strommen. Commissioner Strommen plans to focus her talk on the increase in first-time users of Minnesota's park system and on how park usage connects with the important skills our citi-

zens have learned through our Scouting and Girl Scouting heritage, such as first aid, "leave no trace", safe fire building, camp cooking, and safe tool usage.

Commissioner Strommen holds a bachelor's degree from Grinnell College, where she majored in biology and Latin American *(Continued on Page 2)*

For those new to the Founders Hall Recognition and Celebration, we have three honoree categories. A **Founder** is an individual who has played a substantial role in the advancement of the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or the North Star Museum. A **Founder** is a visionary leader who has played a meaningful role in the creation, innovation, or direction of these institutions over a significant number of years.

Builders are the second group of persons or organizations recognized in the Davis and Randall Hall. Builders have made a meaningful impact on one of the Scouting institutions, through their financial support or gifts of influence. A **Builder** is a trans-

formative leader, persuasive and insightful in their leadership; one who helps make the Founders' vision a reality.

Finally, Founders Hall **Trailblazers** are people who have provided exceptional direct volunteer leadership to Scouting at the grass roots level. Often referred to as "Red Jacket Scouters" in Boy Scouting or "Green Bloods" in Girl Scouting, they carry out the ideas bought forth by the Founders and Builders and deliver them to youth.

The 2022 event celebrates Builder Hugh Gwin and Trailblazer Sharon Reece. There is a separate article containing a photo and more information about each recipient in this issue of the

studies. After graduating from college, she used a Fulbright research scholarship to do field work in Costa Rica, and subsequently earned her master's degree in environmental management from Duke University.

Prior to joining the Minnesota DNR in 2015, Commissioner Strommen served as assistant director at the Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) before becoming acting deputy director. She previously served as policy director for Friends of the

Boundary Waters Wilderness and as associate director of the Minnesota Land Trust. She also served several terms on the Ramsey city council and as mayor from 2012-2018.

Commissioner Strommen oversees a DNR staff of approximately 2,700 located in St. Paul and around the state. The department's mission is to work with Minnesotans to conserve and manage the state's natural resources, providing outdoor recreation opportunities, and

providing for commercial uses of natural resources in a way that creates a sustainable quality of life.

Escape Room Test Run Is Successful

On January 5, a crew of five volunteers set up the Museum's much anticipated Escape Room in preparation for a test run with groups of boys and girls who are active in Scouts BSA and Girl Scouts of America units. The Escape Room actually consists of four rooms using an ancient Egyptian theme. Visitors must work together to decipher the

clues necessary to escape from each room into the next room. A successful escape from room four allows the visitors to return to the modern world.

Two brave groups of kids went through the Escape Room on January 6. They all returned to the modern world with much fanfare and without any harm. Each group took about 55 minutes to get through the four rooms and they stayed to complete an evaluation. The reviews were favorable. Only minor enhancements are necessary for the Escape Room to open for the enjoyment of the general public. Due to the design of the rooms, everything can be set up and broken down in a relatively short time. The complex of rooms fits comfortably inside the Founders Hall.

The official public grand opening of the Escape Room was scheduled for the last weekend of Jan-

Sharon Reece is entering the Founders Hall as a Trailblazer, and what a Trailblazer she is. She has been a Girl Scout member for 56 years and a troop leader for over 40 years. Her roles have included “cookie mom”, service unit manager, outdoor trainer, and 40-year volunteer on the Lakamaga Adult Leadership Conference Planning Committee. She has also served as a Cub Scout den leader for her son and grandsons and outdoor trainer as a Boy Scout volunteer.

Sharon always has a song ready to teach and lead. During her

56 years of Girl Scout membership, she has become known as a “go-to” person around the country due to her encyclopedic knowledge of Girl Scout songs. Hugh H. Gwin: A Real Builder

During his long career as a lawyer, community, and Scouting volunteer, Hugh H. Gwin has demonstrated the attributes of his upcoming Builder designation in the Founders Hall. Hugh grew up in Scouting and reached the rank of Eagle Scout. He attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison, followed by the University of North Dakota School of Law. Hugh received his Juris Doctor degree in 1973. Since 1973, Hugh has practiced law in the Hudson, Wisconsin area.

In addition to his legal career, Hugh supported Scouting in Northern Star Council and its legacy council. He became Scoutmaster of Troop 140 in 1974 and was later the Post Ad-

viser for Post 140. He has been honored with the District Award of Merit and the Silver Beaver Award. Hugh currently serves on the Northern Star Council President's Cabinet.

Hugh is also a long-time supporter of the North Star Museum. His term on the board of directors occurred at a pivotal time shortly after the Museum purchased its building and hired its first full-time staff. The Museum's programs expanded significantly during Hugh's years on the Board.

Hugh's community service includes being a director of The Boys Camp of Hudson, Inc. The non-profit provides recreational land for activities that support

Our members are the foundation of the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting. It has never been easier to become a member of the Museum. - History Keeper (formerly Sustaining Membership) (Minimum of \$10 per month automatically withdrawn from your bank EFT (Electronic Fund Transfer) or charged to your credit card. It can also be a single payment of \$120 or more by check, charge, or as part of the required minimum distribution from your IRA or 401-K): 4 bring a friend passes and 10% gift shop discount.

The easiest way to join or renew is online. Just go to the website at www.nssm.org and scroll down the home page until you get to *Interested in becoming a member or donating*. Click on your selection and follow the prompts. Or, if you do not want

to pay on line, simply return your check or credit card information to the Museum. Thank you for supporting the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting and for supporting the preservation of the history of Girl Scouting and Boy Scouting.

Now, for you Skunks out there. The Order of the Odor, or Skunks, are veterans of the Scouting USA or Girl Scouts USA organizations who are members of the Museum. Many serve as volunteers at the Museum. In 2021, the Skunks instituted a \$5 yearly fee to help offset events and mailings. If you are a History Keeper member of the Museum, you do not have to pay the \$5. You are automatically a member of this smelly group. **To all those who believe they are Skunks, your North Star Museum membership dues must be currently paid before you are officially a Skunk.**
