

In Memoriam: The Loss of a Founder

Robert (Bob) W. Rosene passed away peacefully on June 9, 2020. He was born on August 27, 1924 and was 95 years old. Bob played a major role in the success of the North Star Museum of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting over the past fifteen years. His financial support made possible the purchase of our present headquarters in North St. Paul (the Rosene Center) and his intellectual support played a major role in the development of Museum programming. Bob and his late wife Joyce are enshrined as Founders in the Museum's Founders Hall. What follows includes an excerpt from the obituary published by the Rosene family.

Bob is survived by his brother, Dr. Philip Rosene; son, Richard (Sara) Rosene; daughters, Marilyn (Richard Thompson) Rosene, Barbara (Charles Rose) Rosene, and Laurel (John) Theis; grandchildren; 5 greatgrandchildren, several nieces, nephews, and many friends. Preceded in death by his wife, Joyce; parents, Windom and Helen Rosene; sisters, Mildred Jackman, Margaret Axford, and infant Shirley Mae. Bob was born in Callaway, Nebraska, and grew up in Callaway and Lincoln, Nebraska. Bob grew up in a Scouting family. His father invited Boy Scouts into the family home to hand build hundreds of canoes over the years. They then took those vessels on camping trips to the BWCA in Minnesota. One of those canoes is part of the Museum's collection and is on display at the Museum.



Bob was in the Naval Reserve and V-12 program at the U of M, earning his degree in civil engineering in 1945 and later his master's in 1948. Bob served in WW II with the Navy SeaBees helping with the reconstruction of Okinawa.

Bob met loyce at the U of M in 1947 and married in 1949. They were married over 69 years. While in the Navy they lived in Florida and Georgia, and after his service, in Iowa before returning to Minnesota in 1959. Bob and Joyce raised four children and impacted the lives of countless others through activities, mentoring, and welcoming people into their home. Boy Scouting was a large part of Bob's life. Bob enjoyed family visits, reunions, Boundary Waters canoe trips, and time at the cabin on the St. Croix. was a co-founder of Bonestroo, Rosene, Anderlik & Associates, Inc., and provided leadership in numerous professional engineering organizations. After his retirement in 1992, his volunteer efforts continued at Centennial UMC, Roseville Rotary Club, and Boy Scouting.

A Celebration of the life and legacy of Bob Rosene will be at a later date when family and friends can gather safely. Bob, we will miss you.

Our Little Free Library is Back and Better Than Ever

At the Museum's Annual Meeting on October 11, 2014, we unveiled a Little Free Library made and donated by North Branch Girl Scout Troop 55712. What is a Little Free Library, you ask? Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the world. Children growing up in homes without books are on average three years behind children in homes with lots of books. So, what better way to improve the reading achievement of children than to increase their access to books? Little Free Library booksharing boxes play an essential role by providing 24/7 access to books in areas where books are scarce.

After proudly standing outside our front door on Seventh Avenue for five years, the weather and heavy use got to our Little Free Library and its own front door fell off. Until then, our staff and volunteers inside the Museum often enjoyed watching as people walked by, many with children, and they stopped, picked out a book, or left with a book.

This past month, Mike Herrmann, Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 91 in St. Paul, reinforced the door and hinges while sealing any places where water could leak in.
