

From the Director

Many of you have been asked to respond recently to a member's survey. This survey was commissioned by our Membership Committee as a way to gauge your interest in different aspects of the Museum program, and to find out how you came to be members of the organization.

In my seven years at the Museum, I have always assumed that our primary audience was that sliver of people in the middle of a two-circle Venn Diagram, where people with



an interest in history are in one circle and people who are interested in Scouting programs is in the other. How wrong I have been! Instead, 87% of you have said that your support of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting was paramount in your becoming a museum member, followed by 44.4% who are interested in history (the survey allowed you to cite more than one reason for joining). The truth is that the entire Venn Diagram consists of potential museum supporters! As icing on the cake, the number that gratified me the most was that 27.8% of you joined because you were asked to do so by a friend.

There is no discounting the fact that when you combine a love of Scouting and an interest and respect for history with a personal ask to join, the Museum gains more members. And, members are something of which a museum can never have too many. So, I am going to ask something of all of you . . . bring someone to the Museum and ask them to join us. Remember, this doesn't have to be a history fan, although an affinity for Boy Scouting and/or Girl Scouting helps a great deal. Tell them why you joined and what you like about us. If you call me in advance, I will give you and your guest a personal tour of the Museum, including a glimpse into our challenging back rooms! We would like to grow our membership substantially. The most effective way to grow membership is to get people in the door and ask them to join. You can help us!

A "Boffo" Engagement at the Great Girl Gathering!

On March 10-11, 2012, the Girl Scouts of the Minnesota and Wisconsin River Valleys celebrated the Girl Scout Centennial in grand style with the Great Girl Gathering at the Mall of America. And, the North Star

Museum was there! Thousands of current Girl Scouts, Girl Scout alumnae, and their families invaded the MOA for a terrific experience.

There was plenty to do and see at the event. On Sunday, the entertainment included Disney stars, China Anne McClain and the McClain Sisters. And, the Museum was there! As Executive Director Claudia Nicholson said following the event, "After spending twenty four of the last forty eight hours at the Mall of America, I can safely say that our presence at the Great Girl Gathering was a smart move. Over two days, we saw 3,156 people, an estimated 95% of whom did NOT know about the Museum prior to this event. If a fraction of the people to whom we handed brochures and Girl Scout program flyers to respond over the next two months, we will be swamped."

The work of many volunteers who staffed the Museum exhibit was crucial to the success of the event. Special thanks to Robbi Moore, Kurt Leichtle, Tim Jopek, Lorena Palm, Barb Herrmann, Nora Slawik, and Paul Bartyzal for their hard work. You should also thank Nell Nere next time you see her. She made many of the more than 1500 museum swaps that were handed out to the girls. Girl Scouts, happy 100th!



Steve Lape Awarded Eagle Badge in Emotional Ceremony

On Sunday, February 12, nearly 100 people were on hand at a Court of Honor to see 53-year old Steve Lape receive his Eagle Award. Steve has Down Syndrome but thanks to the Boy Scout special needs program, Steve was able to continue his quest to receive the highest rank available from the Boy Scouts of America.

Troop 594 was founded in the 1970's and Steve has been a member of the troop from the beginning. Several troop members were close to completing their Eagle when it was discovered that Steve's health was declining. So, Steve, his fellow Scouts and the adult leaders of the troop focused on helping Steve fulfill his service project, which was conducted at the Museum last fall. Then, in a moving ceremony, Steve received his award.

A number of Museum members are actively involved in the leadership of Troop 594. They include: Jim Rupert; Charlie Opp; Tim Barrett; and, Faith Anderson. Presentation of the Eagle badge to Steve was particularly emotional for these committed leaders. See another photo of the troop on page 6 of the *Museum News*.

Steve received some well-deserved public attention in addition to the support of those in attendance. A representative of Rep. Betty McCollum's office was also on hand to present a flag that was flown over the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. and a certificate attesting to the flag's authenticity. In addition, the St. Paul Pioneer Press published a photo and an article. To top things off, KSTP sent a crew to film the entire event. The KSTP reporter also did a live feed right in front of the Museum's sign at 5:30. The story was repeated at 10 p.m. The piece was pretty great—for both Steve and the Museum.

Antonio Vandal's Heroism Recognized by Sen. Klobuchar

On February 18, just days after the Steve Lape Eagle ceremony, Antonio Vandal received a National Certificate of Merit for helping his father save a young man's life on a canoe trip. Very few boys of Cub Scout age receive this recognition in a given year, and Antonio was one of them. About 130 guests filled nearly every inch of the Museum. The event even drew Sen. Amy Klobuchar for her first Museum visit. This time, KMSP was present with a crew did a live shot from the Museum. Once again, the coverage was nice—for both Antonio and the Museum.
