Museum Secures Legacy Grant

The Museum got 2018 off to an exciting start by announcing its receipt of a \$46,800 Legacy Grant from the Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Program. The program is funded by the Legacy Amendment to the Minnesota Constitution, which directs tax revenue into a special fund that is administered through a competitive grant application process at the Minnesota Historical Society. The Museum has been awarded only one other Legacy Grant of this magnitude. The other funded the lighting project that replaced and updated all of the lighting in the Museum's Guthmann Family Gallery.

The purpose of the grant is to help ensure better dissemination of the historical and teaching opportunities in the Museum's vast collection to youth, museum patrons, and historians. The primary deliverable of the grant is elimination of the Museum's backlog of proffered collections.

As described in the grant case statement, the Museum has collected artifacts and other material since its inception in 1976. However, we were only professionalized in 2005 and due to our small staff, limited number of volunteers, and other pressing concerns, we have built up a backlog of potential donations that have yet to run through our acquisition process. Today, we face at least 300 boxes of unprocessed or partially-processed material, containing as many as 12,000 artifacts, which date back to 2005. The backlog hampers our ability to fulfill our educational mission and provide researchers with access to some absolutely wonderful material.

The grant will fund several parttime collection assistants devoting over 2100 hours of work to the project. The grant calls for project completion by December I, 2018. By investing this time, we will strengthen our col-



lection, better serve the public, and demonstrate the importance of Girl Scouting and Boy Scouting in Minnesota. We will update our records with these objects' history, allowing us to further serve our educational mission. better preserve what we have, encourage and support researchers in their quest to uncover the heretofore unknown stories of the importance and impact of Boy Scouting and Girl Scouting in Minnesota, and to make possible sharing of both information and collections with other institutions. The Museum is certainly thankful and appreciative that the grant committee recognized the importance of our unfinished collections work.





We Remember a Builder - Howard Guthmann

The fall of 2017 marked a difficult time for the Museum as we lost three of our Founders Hall Founders and Builders: Mike Galvin, Ron Phillippo, and, on December 6, Howard Guthmann. Howard was an energetic and enthusiastic supporter and ambassador of the Museum. His financial support of the Museum was crucial but his leadership and inspiration were priceless. He was promoting the Museum and helping to raise operating funds literally until his last hours.

As you can see from the following excerpts from Howard's published obituary, he had the energy and interest to support countless non-profit and community organizations. Due to his leadership style and dedication to the organizations he supported, each felt that Howard was theirs, and rightfully so: Howard Guthmann, a St. Paul business man, philanthropist, civic activist, education advocate, and mentor to many died on December 6 after a long and wonderful life one week after celebrating his 95th birthday. He practiced accounting with the firm that is now known as Wilkerson Guthmann from 1943 to 2016. His CPA certificate is number 452. Certificates today number well past 28,000. He was a past-president of the Minnesota CPA Society. Howard always said that "the best retirement plan is work." In addition to his business career, he was

active in St. Paul civic affairs, chairing or serving as President of numerous non-profit and civic boards, including the St. Paul Board of Education, the St. Paul Port Authority, the Ramsey County Historical Society, and the Rotary Club of St. Paul. He also served on the St. Paul Charter Commission, the Board of Directors of Regions Hospital, and the Elder Learning Institute/ University of Minnesota. was a co-founder of the St. Paul Public Schools Foundation, the Friends of the St. Paul College Foundation, and the Minnesota Institute for Talented Youth. He had a special interest in the Boy Scouts of America, being registered in the organization for over 80 years. Due to a shortage of adult males after the draft was instituted in 1940, he became a Scoutmaster at only 18 years of age. He later became Council President. also played a critical role in the development of the North Star Museum of Boy and Girl Scouting. When he was President of the St. Paul Jaycees, it was chosen the outstanding chapter in the United States for a unique second year in a row. He received many awards and honors as a result of his community ser-He was active in Unity Church of St. Paul for over 65 years and twice served as its Board Chair. He is survived by Betsy, his wife of 65 years, children Susan Henry (Lawrence), John (Teresa), Debra Ternus

(Mike), and Patricia Haresch (John), 11 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren.

Since Howard's death, there has been an outpouring of memorials to the Museum in his honor. Howard always worked to ensure that every organization with which he worked was on a strong financial footing. Thanks to you, Howard's goal for the Museum is closer to being realized. At 10:15 a.m. on April 28, 2018, there will be a brief reception to honor Howard Guthmann, Ron Phillippo, and Mike Galvin immediately before the Founder's Hall Celebration.
